About the Speakers:

Professor Gordon Giles, PhD, OTR/L, FAOTA, will be presenting on: A Neurofunctional Approach to Rehabilitation of Functional and Behavioral Disregulation Following Traumatic Brain Injury.

Prof. Giles was trained at the first program for behavioral disorder after brain injury in the world, the Kemsley Unit in Northampton UK. Prof. Giles was responsible for opening the first county funded neurobehavioral program in the western US in 1993 and resulted in the movement of hundreds of patients out of state hospitals. Prof. Giles is currently responsible for a 65-bed non-aversive neurobehavioral program in Fremont and a 120 bed Med/Psych program in Sunnyvale, CA. He also teaches at Samuel Merritt University in Oakland, CA. His current research is centered on the role of relationships and non-aversive intervention in rehabilitation of persons with brain injury.

Teepa Snow, MS, OTR/L, FAOTA, will be presenting on: Dementia: Understanding Symptoms and Behaviors and Communicating Effectively for Success.

Ms. Snow has an independent practice specializing in dementia care and dementia education. She has clinical appointments with Duke University's School of Nursing and UNC-Chapel Hill's School of Medicine. She provides training and education for the Alzheimer's Association and Alzheimer Society conferences. She works closely with many different retirement communities, assistive living, nursing homes and day service programs on dementia specialty services throughout the US to improve and optimize services to people with dementia and their families. She has received local, state and national recognition for her expertise in geriatrics and dementia care and programming to professionals, staff and families. She has developed two training videos, published many articles and worked collaboratively to conduct clinical research on dementia care.
